

August 2021 saw a successful start to the Rockhampton First Nations Business Program. This program launched a bespoke business and entrepreneurship training program for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders by the partnership of CQ University, Rockhampton Regional Council through their economic development arm and Advance Rockhampton.

CQ University also coordinated and hosted CQ Junior Robotics competition on 6 August in the Sports Centre. The competition was open to all primary and secondary school students within Central Queensland from Mackay to Bundaberg and out west to Longreach.

Following on with the robotics theme, we advise that a CQ University clinical project that uses electrical stimulation to improve the lives of those living with spinal cord injuries has been named a finalist in the Bionics Challenge 2021. Led by CQ University Lecturer in Neurological Physiotherapy Dr Vanessa Bochkezanian, the Electrical Stimulation (E-Stim) treatment aims to increase muscle mass, reduce spasticity and improve overall physical health.

In a clinical trial run by Dr Bochkezanian, the 12-week program involved using targeted electrical stimulation on patients for up to one hour twice a week. Dr Bochkezanian received a grant from SpinalCure Australia in conjunction with CQ University. The combined funds are currently being used to facilitate a pilot study which has already provided promising results.

The event was a great success and finished with a Careers Hub and Industry Networking Event!



The Loneliness Project, an initiative of Kim Harrington, CQ University Associate Vice President Rockhampton and Central Highlands Regions, was endorsed and adopted by CQ University Rockhampton Region Engagement Committee (RREC). The RREC championed the Loneliness Project for several years until the inception of End Loneliness Inc. in March 2021.

The Loneliness Project "Empowering Connections - Ending Loneliness" Ms Harrington said loneliness doesn't discriminate. It can touch people from all walks of life, all socio-economic backgrounds and all ages.

It was with sadness that I share that our Chaplain Rev. Matthew Taylor relocated to Tasmania. Chaplain Matt connected and supported students at CQ University and Capricornia Students living in Capricornia College. Chaplain Matt was invaluable during his three year association with CQ University and we wish him the best in his new post in Tasmania. There were probably other things on that tree that marvellous Christmas but this is what I've remembered over the 77-78 years. It's true that little things mean a lot!



You have all heard of COVID-19. Well, just like a computer problem, this is creating scams too. So, from the horses mouth “**Scam watch** has been receiving reports of scammers sending a text message or email stating that your vaccine passport is available. This is a scam. **Do not** click on any links and delete the message.

It's important to remember that all COVID-19 vaccines are free. Also, at this stage, the only way you can access your COVID-19 digital certificates online is via myGov or your Medicare Plus Express app. The government is **NOT** sending individual text messages about the availability of your certificate or passport.

Judy Blanchard, our Digital Skills group coordinator, <https://www.u3arockhampton.org.au/judyblanch.htm>, has had classes on accessing **myGov**. To start you in a helpful way this link will help you understand the process.

**BIRD WATCHING
with
Rod Elder**



It was a great day for birding: - temperature 19 C overnight and 30 C maximum, medium winds and some cloud.

We took chairs and were able to sit in one very shady spot near the old Tropic of Capricorn marker. Although the water had dried up, there was a broad expanse of green vegetation across the Woolwash bed.

After an hour we moved further along the Woolwash back towards Rockhampton where there was still water and shade and as a result, we saw a different cohort of birds, again while sitting and consuming our morning teas. We all had binoculars and were able to see every bird. Ian, who is fast becoming our resident photo recorder, took some excellent photos. The telescope facilitated viewing of the Channel-billed Cuckoo which sat some time in a distant tree for us.

Birds were identified as - Masked Lapwing, Whiskered Tern, Channel-Billed Cuckoo, Sacred Kingfisher with wing outstretched, Sacred Kingfisher, Brolga, Red-Backed Wren, Golden-headed Cisticola

Highlights were Channel-Billed Cuckoos, which had only recently arrived from their winter northern migration. There was even a Brolga and Pelicans soaring overhead. Golden-headed Cisticolas flew around the low vegetation. They are common in grasslands but probably have not been seen before by the group.



Miss Charlene Mason sang, 'I will not pass this way again' - giving obvious pleasure to the congregation.

I saw a large Christmas tree surrounded by gaily packed presents. Leading me forward, he said to a lady and two small boys, “Look what I've brought you for Christmas.”

With shrieks of delight the two youngsters ran over and started to pat me and talk to me. “Let's call him Bob,” they cried out. “Hey, wait a minute,” the man said, “let's take him into the kitchen and find him something to eat. He's very thin and must be very hungry.”

That was to be the first of my many Christmases with the Wellings family – my family, where I first experienced the love of Christmas.


